Clifford Shapiro - I was accepted by the AAA to be a member of its national arbitration panel for construction disputes. In addition, I recently spoke before the Society of Illinois Construction Attorneys about "Ethical Negotiations In Mediation: How Far Is Too Far Or Is It Ever Appropriate To Lie During Mediation?" The discussion was based in large part on Buzz Tarlow's recent article published in the ACCL Journal titled "In Defense of Lying: The Ethics of Deception In Mediation." Topics included whether misrepresentations in mediations are common, whether mediations structured to include some accepted level of deception, and whether the role of a mediator as a "Settlement Master" includes or encourages some accepted level of deception. The ethical rules that apply to conduct during mediation, including Rules 4.1 and 8.4 of the Model Rule of Professional Conduct the Model Standards Conduct

for Mediators, were also discussed. A very interesting discussion ensued, and the consensus in the room was that the mediation process does include a level of consensual, anticipated and acceptable negotiating practices and tactics that, at times, are not based on full disclosure. But there was also consensus that there are ethical lines to be drawn, including a prohibition on false statements of material fact.

Larry Schor - Susan and I just returned from a trip down the River Seine to the D Day beaches.

We were there on June 4 and the crowds were very large already. A lot of people dress in World War II military uniforms and ride around in restored World War II vehicles. Each town above the beaches has its own museum and they are all good. It was great to see and we can only imagine what it will be next year for the 75th anniversary. 
